## **Listening Guide**

1.	sff One loud CHORD precedes martial THEME 1A many SEQUENCES
2.	THEME 1B – fistfuls of CHORDS · Raise eyebrows when THEME 1A returns
3.	Eruptive <b>THEME 2</b> (how many times?)
4.	Lyrical <b>THEME 2</b> variant occurs and is e x p a n d e d
5.	TEMPO takes off — FULL ORCHESTRA joins # then slows down
6.	FRENCH HORNS, TROMBONES, CLARINETS, BASSOONS announce DEVELOPMENT (raise hands)
DEVEL	OPMENT
7.	Fiendishly difficult PIANO VARIATION on THEME 1A • Equally difficult PIANO VARIATION follows
8.	The & precede lyrical 3rd <b>PIANO VARIATION WOODWINDS</b> take over <b>(</b> respond)
9.	VIOLAS & CELLOS quote Movement I · PIANO, & share another moment
10.	another fiendishly difficult PIANO VARIATION on THEME 1A $\cdot$ Ends with SEQUENCES
11.	TIMPANI followed by SOLO PIANO conclude DEVELOPMENT
RECAP	ITULATION
12.	THEME 1A played first by the this time · PIANO takes off — THEME 1A
13.	STRINGS "push off" another playful passage for PIANO and orchestra then
14.	plays THEME 1A RHYTHM in step ASCENDING SEQUENCE • CRASH CYMBALS!
15.	PIANO takes off "like a bat" on THEME SOLO WOODWINDS and BRASS comment
16.	Up tempo account of lyrical <b>THEME 2</b> variant (not so lyrical) then

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- 17. CODA begins with "growls" from STRINGS & PIANO • Another "volcanic" CRESCENDO & SEQUENCE
- 18. The orchestra reaches "edge of the cliff" PIANO SOLOIST jumps off and plays CADENZA
- "THE POINT" THEME 1A and lyrical THEME 2 both present ... and one last swoon = 19.
- 20. Nothing left to do but END IT! RACH-MAN-I-NOFF!

Maull was born and raised in Philadelphia and now resides in Bedminster, New Jersey with his wife, pianist and accompanist Marcia Maull.
